JOHN HAYWOOD HOUSE



This was the House of John Haywood Yeoman, he married Mary Hodges on 29th Dec 1755. They had six children. John died in 1812 and Mary died in 1818 aged 86 and is buried at Breedon.

At the time of the Enclosures Act 1806 they acquired the house and field and two other enclosures in the village, indicating that they were relatively affluent

At that time he was described as a Coal Hauler but finds of medieval Ticknall Ware indicates that this property had been occupied by Pedlars for centuries. The house and outbuildings would be used for stabling pack ponies and storage.

Ticknall was a major pottery centre from the 15th Century; due to the good communications this locality was involved in the sale and distribution of the pottery into the East of England and further.

The earliest documented trader was Edward Warden of Griffydham. When his will was made in 1614 he had a number of debts to Potters in Ticknall for Ware. His son John continued in the trade. The peak of the trade was the end of the 18th century when there were 49 known pot sellers in the Coleorton Area.
